MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Vincentians, it is still time to register for our Annual General Assembly that will take place this year from June 20 to 24, in St. John's, N.L. Do not miss that opportunity to meet sisters and brothers from across Canada, participate to very instructive workshops and obtain information on local or National Council projects during the Friday afternoon and Saturday morning plenary sessions. You may also take time to renew yourself spiritually during prayer periods and daily Eucharist celebrations. As well, you will have plenty of time to meet other Vincentians from all over the country and socialize with them at mealtimes or during your free time at the end of the day. I am certain that this downtime will allow you to recharge your batteries, and return home with new knowledge that will help you in your volunteer work within the Society.

RECRUITMENT OF NEW MEMBERS

It is increasingly difficult to recruit new members, and we must find the way to continue recruiting if we want to ensure that succession will be available once we are ready to move on to something else. For most conferences, the search for new members is done pretty well in the same way it has always been done, approaching people and asking them to join us, explaining what we do and why we do it, without omitting to tell them that we believe they are entirely capable of doing that particular volunteer work.

But we also know that nowadays, people are more reluctant to engage in an activity that tends to be repetitive. They prefer to get involved in short-term activities and participate when they are available. One only has to watch television to realize that this is what people are looking for.

I know that a few conferences across the country have started modifying their approach. Rather than full-time vincentians, they seek to recruit auxiliary volunteers, who come and give a hand for one, two or three activities. They then make sure that those people discover the whole spectrum of conference activities, by including them in their mailing list (minutes of meetings, invitations to activities, conference newsletters, etc.). As well, let us not forget to invite them to participate when we organize activities. The more they get involved in the conference, the more likely they will become full-fledged members over time. As I was saying, some conferences in Canada have adopted that approach, or a similar approach, and the results are amazing. However, there is a basic rule: we must keep those new members busy. If they join us to organize an activity, we must make sure to invite them to participate when the activity takes place. I am convinced that if you add that type of approach to your recruitment tools, you will rapidly have more volunteers to share the various tasks undertaken by your conference, which will also give your regular members some breathing room.

Good luck and happy recruiting.

TWINNING

PERU

Twinning is one aspect of Vincentian work where we reach out to share our resources and deepen our Vincentian spirit of friendship with our brothers and sisters, and in this solidarity of friendship, help the poor.

Twinning is a special part of the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul work. One of our conferences chooses another conference from a poorer country and provides funding for them to help the poor in their area.

PRAYER

Twinned conferences pray for each other and for Vincentians around the world. We do this by including prayers at our regular meetings so that they may continue their work to serve the poor. We can also offer a Mass for our intentions on a mutually agreed date.

CORRESPONDENCE KEEPING

There is a regular exchange of correspondence, by letter, email and through Facebook. That correspondence concerns mutual projects and our respective experiences, confidential local area interests, and photos of both groups.

FINANCIAL AND MATERIAL ASSISTANCE

The conference that chose the twinning group assists the other conference through financial payments that are made quarterly or whenever they choose, such as yearly. It seems that quarterly is a better way, as the conference can more easily budget to carry out its mission to help brothers and sisters in need. Our twinning conference has used the money to assist their parish in building a structure to be used by the entire parish for Mass, Sunday school, meetings, etc. Therefore, all members of their community have benefitted from our commitment to that conference. Our twinning conference uses the building to distribute food and clothing and for special celebrations at Christmas, Lent, Easter, First Communion and other occasions and holidays celebrated in their country.

TWINNING EXPERIENCE

Twinning helps both conferences grow spiritually as Vincentians and gives us the opportunity to assist our brothers and sisters in need wherever we can. It develops friendships that can spread from one conference to another and it also develops an appreciation for each other's work and helps build Vincentian fraternity, while reaping the rewards and blessings we receive in serving our brothers and sisters.

OUTLINED BELOW IS SOME OF THE WORK DONE BY OUR TWINNING CONFERENCE IN PERU IN 2017

Our twinning conference consists of 16 members, both men and women. They work diligently on numerous activities to raise funds to help the needy in their community.

January: The conference assisted a child in extreme poverty.

April: Social work was provided to help a good student in extreme poverty.

May: Helped mothers in extreme poverty. In Peru, Mother's Day is the second Sunday in May.

June: Helped fathers in extreme poverty. In Peru, Father's Day is the third Sunday in June.

July: Helped elders in extreme poverty. In Peru, a day in July is dedicated to the Elders of Peru.

October: Helped families. In Peru, this is called Purple Month – the Month of Christ's Crucifixion.

December: Helped the children with some social time for Christmas, the Birth of Jesus.

All of these activities are funded by the money the conference collects through fundraising activities and from the funding support our conference provides every quarter. Our twinning conference is very grateful for our support and we are extremely happy that we are able to provide the money so that they are able to do their work for their brothers and sisters in need. The area where they live is Grappa province, where there was an earthquake in 2007. The area is still not back to normal and many families remain without homes. A lot of people still live in unprotected areas; our conference understands that these people live in terrible conditions.

In closing, we do what our mission statement requires: I was hungry, thirsty, naked, sick, a stranger, a prisoner, and you cared.

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"TOGETHER, CARING FOR THE POOR"

For the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul (SSVP), promoting social justice is a priority. During a meeting with members of the Mother Teresa Conference, Msgr. Valéry Vienneau, Archbishop of Moncton, expressed the desire to promote the Church's social doctrine. To respond to that wish and to highlight the importance of collaboration between charities, members of the Mother Teresa Conference organized a halfday session in Moncton on March 24, 2018.

The session's theme underscored the crucial role of cooperation in creating a fairer society. Robert Lebel's beautiful song, "All together, we could change the world one day to the next, heart by heart, through actions from the heart" (translation), kicked off the session. With a guitar accompaniment, the event's 65 participants sang that inspiring song in unison.

The first part of the session was an overview of key elements of social doctrine by Msgr. Vienneau. He referred to the Leo XIII Encyclical, Rerum novarum ("Of the new things"), which, in 1891, signaled the first principle of this doctrine by affirming the importance of paying workers fair wages, in respect of their dignity. Based on the tenet that every human is created in the image of God, the Church's entire social doctrine gives each person inalienable dignity. The second principle refers to the common good, which gives the State the responsibility of protecting all its citizens. For example, the taxation system is designed to redistribute resources so that everyone benefits from the basic necessities of life. The third principle of the Church's social doctrine is that of subsidiarity, i.e. that the responsibility of decisions must be borne by those most directly affected by them. In regards to children's education, for example, the parents' will must take precedence over State decisions. The fourth principle is that of solidarity. Each person must be aware of their community of interest, which entails a moral obligation to help his or her fellow man. Finally, the last principle is that of the

preferential protection of the poor. Jesus surrounded himself with the poor and the Church invites everyone to grow closer to the poor.

During the second part of the session, five humanitarian organiza-

tions briefly summarized their work to end poverty: the Peter Mc-Kee Community Food Centre, the YWCA Centre for Women and Children, the House of Nazareth shelter, the Department of Social Development of New Brunswick and the YMCA's Reconnect program. After those presentations, representatives from nine other organizations motivated by Christian values were given an opportunity to speak: the Salvation Army, Second Chance Workshop/ Enviro Plus, the Knights of Columbus, the Ste-Thérèse Parish Kindness Committee, the St-Augustine Parish Clothing Depot, Karing Kitchen, the St-Augustine Parish Ray of Hope Needy

The information gathered from those 14 organizations was both interesting and illuminating. Those present discovered how many services are offered to the poor in the Moncton area. Much is done by those motivated by their faith, which indicates a high degree of solidarity with the poor. It also shows how the Church's social justice principles, as listed by Msgr. Vienneau, are being applied. A shared meal closed out the session, in a festive atmosphere, full of sharing and networking.
