MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

WHY WOULD I GO TO WINDSOR ON JUNE 19-23, 2019?



This will be the 48th Annual General Assembly (AGA) of the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul in Canada. It will also be a time to recharge our batteries, meet Vincentians from across the country, share with others and see the good work accomplished on a daily basis in all areas of Canada. It is important to remember that every

year, close to 15,000 Vincentians in Canada bring assistance to more than 325,000 people in need.

Thursday, June 20th, will be dedicated to member education and enhancing Vincentian spirituality, through friendly exchanges in workshops addressing various topics, from social justice to governance. That is an integral part of the Society's evolving training curriculum, as described in the December 2018 Vincenpaul that outlines four areas of interest: i) Vincentian Life; ii) Leadership; iii) Spirituality; iv) Special Works/ Stores.

Education is ongoing throughout our lives and we should seize every opportunity. We can always learn more.

This edition of Vincenpaul includes details of the activities and events taking place during the AGA. We encourage voting members to be present, and all members of our Society are welcome to participate in this very rewarding meeting. In line with the social teaching of the Church, these days offer an educational experience that allows us to expand the spiritual aspect of the Society's work, respecting human dignity and our preferential option for the poor. This year, we want to follow the path of natural environment stewardship, as reflected in Pope Francis' encyclical, Laudato Si', and remember how important it is to keep this in mind in all of our actions. We remind you that the statutory meeting of the AGA, a legal requirement, is taking place on Saturday afternoon, June 22nd. As noted in the Rule, Article 2.6.2, the national council must convene a meeting annually to:

- present the minutes of the previous Annual General Assembly;
- present the reports of the National President, of the Board of Directors and of the various committees;
- present the annual audited financial statements for approval;
- present the operating budget of the National Council for approval;
- vote on the appointment of financial auditors;
- discuss and vote on the adoption of all motions presented by the Board;
- proceed with the installation of the new national president, if it is an election year; (2019 being an election year, we will proceed with the installation of Claude Bédard, President elect.)
- present executive officers for approval;
- present, for approval, the amount of the annual financial contribution that every council must send to the national office, to cover administrative expenses as well as expenses related to the development of the Society, redistribution and international obligations.

Participation in the AGA keeps the movement alive, a movement that was started in 1833 in Paris, and is present today all over the world. Your participation helps solidify everything we have learned, and transform it into plans and actions to help people in a situation of poverty.

Looking forward to welcoming many of you at the University of Windsor, June 19 to 23.


