Prison Ministry

CELEBRATION 2012

Since 2008, we, as members of the Society of a larger Vincentian Family have had special reasons each year to celebrate and rejoice in who we are. Last year in 2011, we chose to celebrate the year of the Spiritual Advisor. I have heard from many that September 27th was the special day that many chose to install their Spiritual Advisors.

It is, and will always continue to be a time to recognize the special role they play in assisting all of us to a greater awareness of the privilege we have of making Gospel-based decisions. Those special decisions that affect all those we serve at all levels of the Society.

It is hoped that we will continue to recognize the importance of this special position through installations and prayerful experiences.

At the 2011 AGA in Victoria, we heard a wonderful presentation from our key note speaker, Bishop Gary Gordon from Whitehorse YT, regarding Prison Ministry. It seemed that his presentation had touched the hearts of many. This is a ministry that is not as well known as it could be.

The Canadian Statutes and Rule Book 2.7.5 highlights Prison Ministry thusly:

This is a key directive from Christ to act with compassion and love for those incarcerated. In cooperation with the prison authorities including the prison chaplain, Vincentians may receive permission to visit jails. They arrange opportunities for Eucharistic prayer services, the sacrament of Reconciliation, and Spiritual Counseling.

I will separate out the following:

Walking the hallways and ranges of the prison, and inquiring about the physical and spiritual needs of the inmates as well as those of their loved ones are some of the ways that Vincentians may serve. This is indeed a challenge and it is recognized that Prison Ministry may not fit for all, but where there is a need, this need should be met in some fashion. Remember, "No work of Charity is foreign to the Society".

We will be presenting a plenary session on Prison Ministry at the AGA in Halifax that will further develop the practical aspects of what prison ministry can and should be about in local areas that have jails or prisons.

Therefore, I am declaring 2012 the year of:

Celebrating the graces of prison ministry.

When I was rector of Notre-Dame Cathedral Basilica in Ottawa I experienced one of the restorations of the Cathedral organ. Originally installed by Joseph Casavant in 1849 the organ had several restorations over the years. It has over 4,000 pipes.

It is a true marvel when a good organist marshals all the power of the organ to produce music that is indeed heavenly. The essence of an organ is internal mechanical cooperation and harmony. This of course is brought about through the talents of the organist.

This symbol can help us reflect on the human truth that the talents of the great and the humble are needed to bring about good success in any enterprise. But leadership is needed to bring about order and organization along with supportive encouragement.

On the occasion of Thanksgiving the Catholic High School in my parish gave wonderful assistance to our SSVP Conference by amassing over 8,000 food items. It was a school-wide effort but would never have happened without the tireless efforts of the outstanding pastoral assistant assigned to the school.

All this leads us to reflect on a difficulty that plagues the SSVP. Too few members seem to want to volunteer for the required leadership roles of the Society. While it is true that the strength of the SVP Society resides in the dedicated work of the many, this very work is possible when good leadership is exercised. It may be more satisfying to be in direct contact with the poor but the Society's on-going capacity to provide such service where needs are, requires experienced Vincentians to appreciate the importance of leadership at the various levels of the Society.

A final word of gratitude should be directed to those who are currently giving top-class leadership to the Society.

THE LIGHT OF CHRIST



Today's world is one where a number of us take for granted how simple things have become. We know, for instance that we can plug in the toaster and make toast for breakfast; we only need to push a button and turn on the stove to prepare meals, bake cookies. We can store our foods in the refrigerator, turn on the heat in the winter to keep warm and turn on the air conditioner in the summer to stay cool.

We can turn on our computer and communicate immediately with family and friends anywhere in the world. When we want to relax, we turn on the TV or settle ourselves in our favorite chair, turn on the light and read a book. All this we are able to enjoy because of electricity.

Suddenly we are struck with a blinding snowstorm and the power goes off. We can't cook our food, turn on the heat, talk on the computer, watch TV or read a book. It is even difficult to maneuver from room to room as we don't have any light. The whole house, indeed the entire city is in darkness. We have all experienced the difficulties that can occur when we have no light. We are struck with feeling helpless and out of control. We are afraid because we can't see where we are going without the lights. We are lost and can't find our way in the dark. Jesus is our "spiritual" light. Because of Him, we have the Eucharist we have the Eucharist to feed us. We have His arm around us to keep us safe and warm and He helps us find our way in the dark because, in Him, there is no darkness. We never need to feel that we are lost because we know that He is the way.

It is a blessing that, as Christians, we are part of His light. This blessing doesn't make us better than others around us. It makes us more responsible. The faithful followers of Jesus are the salt of the earth and a light to the world. Being true Christian-bearers we become an example for others.

In Matthew 5.14-16 Jesus tells us "You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hidden. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lamp stand, and it gives light to the whole house. In the same way, let your light shine before human beings, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven."

This is what we are called to do as Christians. As Vincentians, this calling has a more profound meaning because we believe that those we serve are the human face of the Suffering Christ. We always try and see the face of Christ in those we serve and we strive to be the face of Christ to those we serve. We desire to love and serve our brothers and sisters as He showed us and the Lord also promises that those who share their food with the hungry and their clothing with the naked shall find favor with God. A light shall shine for them.

God has revealed to us in Isaiah 58. 6-10 how He wants us to be. He tells us:

Is this not the fast that I choose:

to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and break every yoke?

Twinning

Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see them naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin?

Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before you, the glory of the Lord shall be your rear guard. Then you shall call and the Lord will answer; you shall cry for help, and he will say, "Here I am."

If you remove the yoke from among you, the pointing of the finger, the speaking of evil, if you offer food to the hungry and satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness.

We are not God - we are humans and humans are not perfect as He is perfect. We sometimes have difficulty being the light that He calls us to be. When that happens, take a few minutes of quiet and talk with Him. Imagine that you see Him coming toward you. His light is magnificent- bright and strong, but at the same time, soft and comforting. He reaches out to you and takes you in His arms. Rest quietly in His arms and feel the love and compassion that He has for you. When you are ready, step back and watch as He walks away. Then, take the strength, love , compassion and light that He has given you and do the same for you brothers and sisters in need.

Part Two

Proposed Goals:

Goal One - Spirituality - To increase the observable spirituality within the Society

This was an original goal that resulted in the creation of the National Spirituality committee. While this committee has done some wonderful things, we'd invite your comments on the results to this point and whether there are other objectives that should be addressed.

Goal Two - Communications

This was also an original goal that has seen a number of improvements. Once again, what do you think of these improvements and are there other objectives that could be included in this goal.

Goal Three - Public Relations/Image

This is another original goal that stated there is an overall lack of public awareness of the Society. Our National Council has created a committee to address this issue but we'd welcome all comments on how we best achieve this goal and what the objectives should be.

Goal Four - Systemic Change

While the need for Advocacy was a previous goal that resulted in the creation of our National Voice of the poor committee, the notion of systemic change is a fairly new concept that is being promoted within the entire Vincentian Family (VINFAM) as evidenced at last year's VINFAM meeting in Belleville,Il,USA, and our 2011 VINFAM meeting being this October 19-23rd in Indianapolis,In,USA.

While all Vincentians are familiar with Charity as being the act of helping people meet their present needs by supplying material assistance, Systemic Change is about making fundamental change in the system so that people can help themselves. It's about making changes that address the root causes of barriers for those in need to escape the cycle of poverty. It is probably the most spiritual work we can do as Vincentians, as it includes an intimate relationship with those we seek to serve, and in turn, with Jesus Christ.

Part Three

We'd like to invite your suggestions for any other strategic planning goals by submitting up to a maximum of FOUR additional goals to be considered for inclusion in the revised strategic plan.

Please include an explanation of these additional goals that describes why you feel this is an important goal.

Who should be involved in this process? I'd request that you distribute this request to all Central and Particular councils as well any selected conferences or individual members as you deem relevant. Let's make this as much of a "grass roots" exercise as possible.

All replies should be returned to the attention of your Regional President so that he/she could review and compile a summary of all responses before sending on to my attention.

Part Four

Now, to the timeframe. In order to achieve our goal of having a revised strategic plan ready for our 2012 AGA (June 2012 in Halifax), we'd ask that you send your replies in by the end of February, 2012.

Emergency Relief

FAMINE RELIEF IN THE HORN OF AFRICA

A famine is affecting many countries in the Horn of Africa, particularly Somalia, Ethiopia, Kenya and Uganda. Several conferences and councils made inquiries this past summer about relief assistance by the Society.

Millions of people have sought refuge in large camps supervised by the United Nations, tens of thousands have perished, mostly children, as a result of a severe drought which has destroyed crop and livestock, civil war (Somalia) and deficient assistance by local governments.

The Society has either no presence or not enough Conferences in most of the countries affected, except Uganda, to propose any important relief assistance project. Nevertheless, the International Council General (ICG) does not want to abandon the victims; an E-mail message was received from the ICG on September 14, 2011, stating it would seek the collaboration of other Vincentian Family organisations and other Catholic charities to bring relief assistance to the famine victims. Donations were requested from all councils and conferences world-wide.

Our National President, Penny Craig, immediately forwarded the appeal to the Regional Council Presidents advising that conferences or councils wishing to send funds for famine relief pass them up to the National Council of Canada via their next higher council. Contributions will be forwarded to the ICG when received.

Your generosity and prayers are requested for this large scale human catastrophe.

We are diverse in the jobs we have and the homes and families we have, but we worship the same God and belong to the same family of Christ and the same Vincentian family and so comes our unity.

With our education and formation we hope to continue with that unity in our diverse country and will be preparing for you a special weekend for trainers in the spring. Wet your appetite for it and be prepared to come to Ottawa for TNT it will be a blast! You will hear more from the Regional Presidents on the dates and location details. We are hoping that at least two people from each Regional will attend. We will share with you many tips and tools to take back and train others to go forward to serve those in poverty in unity. You will share with us things that you are doing. So we on the Education/Formation team can also learn. We know there are good workshops happening and we need to gather this info and share it. Just like we share everything we have. We share all the haves with the have nots and that goes for our knowledge as well. So come to the TNT and show us what you got.

Systemic change is the wave of the future and seems to be more than a ripple across the world. In many ways it is putting into practice some of the things we already know and have heard from St. Vincent, Frederic and Jesus. We are challenged to lift people from poverty. We are challenged to find that way.

What we have been calling Advocacy is just a small part of the Systemic change. This is the "Never do for others what they can do for themselves part. That does not mean we dump them and say, "Do it yourself!" We work with them to help them lift themselves out of poverty. Isn't that what we are called to do? We still play the Good Samaritan Role.

First of all we have to change our language. "We are not poor!!!" Cry out those we help. "We are in poverty!!! Our situation is poor. Our living standards are poor and when you call me poor, I feel like that is my lot in life. I am living in poverty now, but I can change that with a little help." Systemic change is not for those living in poverty it is us.

We are called to serve Christ who is in poverty. Somehow when poverty comes in the door, love goes out the window. We come to the door and we pray before coming and somehow our love isn't always there, we judge. Oh, maybe not by words, but our body language is so loud. It isn't what we say; it is what we don't say. We really want them to be like us. So we ask the questions and they give the answers we want to hear. (Don't you want to be like me?)

We need to find the root cause of why they are living in poverty. We don't answer that question, but give those we visit the opportunity to answer that question or at least ponder on it. Remember one size does not fit all. Everyone is not going to fit into the same programme

So, we need to learn and our education/formation on systemic change is another small part of how we serve Christ and all who are in poverty around this diverse world.

"One cannot improve human beings but one can improve systems. And the same flawed human beings with a better system will be able to produce better results." SYSTEMIC CHANGE.

Systemic Change in Action - Marillac Place

Throughout Canada, there are countless young mothers who are homeless, have little support and are being put in unimaginable situations that most of us will never experience in a lifetime. Under the guidance of the Kitchener Particular Council in the Ontario Regional Council, there is one special place that is working hard to alter the lifelong outcomes for young mothers and their precious babies. That place is Marillac Place.

Marillac Place is a shelter located in Kitchener, Ontario established as a Special Works Conference, of the Society of St. Vincent De Paul, Kitchener Particular Council in the Ontario Regional Council. We opened our doors over 20 years ago with a vision to help women in need. Marillac Place continues to this day to fulfill its mission of providing chances for brighter futures to mother-led families and ultimately helping them to



break the downward generational cycle of homelessness and poverty.

From the outside, Marillac Place looks just like any other home on the street; a three story brick, Victorian home. However, the story behind the walls is very different. Its behind these walls that hundreds of young mothers have found support, guidance and love at a time when they need it the most. Most importantly, they have found a community of like minded people who want nothing but the best for themselves and their infants, while asking nothing in return.

It can be hard to comprehend the struggles that each of the mothers who come to Marillac Place has faced throughout their lives; abandonment, disappointment, violence and soul-numbing loneliness, which only just scratch the surface. Truly, the human spirit is hard at work helping these women persevere in the toughest of situations.

Marillac Place is here for:

- The young woman who fell in love with her boyfriend who promised her the world - only to find him absent and no longer taking her calls when he found out that she was pregnant.
- The young woman, whose mother passed away when she was 18, found out she was pregnant & moved back in with her stepfather. She was afraid to tell him she was pregnant and for good reason - when she finally worked up the courage, he responded by telling her that she had a few weeks to find somewhere else to live.
- The mother who called from the hospital delivery ward because she had no address to put down for her home.
- The mother who lost care of her child and is working hard to get her child back.

Our mission is to provide mothers with the tools they need to become effective parents and self-supporting, responsible members of the community.

Living at Marillac Place is a life-changing experience. The mothers work very hard to achieve their goals, whether it is to parent alone, parent with the support of

family or to place their child up for adoption. Our role is to support the mothers as they make these important decisions and prepare them with the skills and resources they need to support their decision. However, it takes hard work and commitment from each mother. If they haven't completed High School, they are required to continue their education. All mothers are responsible for cooking, cleaning and maintaining the home, not only for themselves, but for everyone else in the home.

The mothers also learn to budget. Each month, their Ontario Works cheques go directly to Marillac Place and a portion goes towards rent. The remainder of the cheque is returned to them for their personal needs, so that they can budget for items such as diapers, formula, school supplies, cell phone bills, bus tickets and miscellaneous items for themselves and their little one. As their time at Marillac Place continues, they learn to effectively budget their money and use what they have wisely.

While living at Marillac Place, there are rules and consequences but most importantly, there is praise and reward.

It takes a strong team at Marillac Place to help each mother. Marillac Place is fully staffed 24 hours a day. Our staff and caring volunteers provide support in times of struggle, hope in moments of despair, insight in times of uncertainty and guidance on the path to productive parenting.

Our team includes a Program Manager, who spends time each day with the mothers, helping them to gain valuable life skills. She provides mandatory weekly on-site programming, catered to meet the proprietary needs of the mothers in the house. These programs cover topics such as caring for your child, parenting, breastfeeding, healthy versus unhealthy relationships and body image, to name a few.

Additionally, we have a ResidentCounsellor who works closely with each mother, acting as a support system, helping them to identify, plan for and ultimately achieve their goals. She liaises with community support groups and systems to ensure mothers are getting the help they need and meets monthly with the supports involved to review the mother's accomplishments and setbacks, evaluating her progress towards meeting her goals.

What is very clear to us on a daily basis is that there is a great need for Marillac Place within our community. Currently all 10 bedrooms at Marillac Place are taken with 10 mothers, 3 babies, a toddler and several moms expecting their little one in the next few months. The mothers are able to stay at Marillac Place for up to 12 months and we accommodate children up to 24 months of age. This unique mandate gives our team a chance to really help make positive changes in these young women's lives.

The consequences that can come if something isn't done to help these mothers now can be heartbreaking and negatively life altering.

What they need is support, guidance, education and someone they can count on.

If Marillac Place ceased to operate, there would be mothers who without the skills, means and support would be at great risk of not being able to parent their child. We would see an increased number of homeless mothers and see more children in an already overburdened foster care system. Marillac Place provides hope in a safe, supportive environment for at-risk mothers to prove that they can parent.

In 2010, 35 mothers and 21 children called Marillac Place home. With stays ranging from a few days to 12 months, we were there for each mother in need. After their time at Marillac Place 9 of the 35 mothers moved into subsidized housing, 6 were able to move in with family and friends and 5 mothers moved into market housing. Our staff answered more than 782 outreach calls from families and we provided 17 food hampers to mothers in need of assistance. 5 mothers were able to regain care of their child though our Plan to Parent Program.

Marillac Place was named after Saint Louise de Marillac. Louise de Marillac was born near Meux, France on August 12, 1591. In 1625, she met Vincent de Paul, who became her spiritual adviser. She devoted the rest of her life to working with him and helped direct his Ladies of Charity in their work of caring for the sick, the poor and the neglected. I feel confident that Saint Louise de Marillac would be very proud of the work done at Marillac Place. I think she would be honoured that the Society of St. Vincent De Paul Particular Council Kitchener had the insight to open Marillac Place and name it in her honour.

Marillac Place has had its share of struggles!

Sadly, there have been several times since our doors opened that we have faced closure. With regional and provincial funding covering roughly half of our operating expenses, we rely heavily on donations to stay open. There are a lot of people who care about Marillac Place and contribute what they can so that we can continue our mission. With all of the struggles we've gone through over the years, I believe its Louise De Marillac's gentle spirit that has always guided us through. If she were around today, I would be privileged to welcome her to Marillac Place and witness the works done in continuation of her efforts and her name!

As a mother of a five year old with another one on the way, I can appreciate the depth of knowledge, skills and help required by these young mothers. While an affluent society around them goes about its business with individual goals - perhaps to grow a company, buy a bigger house, a nicer car, designer clothes or the latest electronic devices - our mothers have goals too. Their goals are as simple as a better tomorrow, a roof over their heads, food to eat - and at the heart of each of them is the goal for a better life for their child.

The Great Guignolée 2011 in Orleans, Ontario

The huge Guignolée (Christmas drive) organized by the Conference Jesus-Marie-Joseph of Orléans, was held on Sunday afternoon December 4th. Following a solid tradition, several hundred volunteers took to the streets of the city to collect non-perishable food, clothing and money. Monsignor Peter Schonenbach, Pastor of the Saint Joseph Parish and Spiritual Advisor to the National Council, sent out the guignoleux - guignoleuses on their mission with a blessing at the 11:30 AM mass. The volunteers, composed of approximately 50 Full Members supported by Auxiliary Members, youth members of the Scouts and Girls Guides, Knights of Columbus, members of various groups active at the 4local Catholic parishes, a few families served by the Conference, as well as a large number of parishioners assured the success of the annual Campaign held during Advent.

The National President, Sister Penny Craig, had extended her stay at the National Office in Ottawa to be part of the community event. It was her second experience of participating at a Guignolée. She joined 1st Vice President Clermont Fortin, a member of the Conference, to walk the streets of the city in a joyful and fraternal ambiance. The citizens of Orléans showed, again, their generosity as the results showed the best ever collection for all those less fortunate of their neighbourhood: 2 cub vans filled with used clothing were sent to the Ottawa SSVP Store, a large amount of dry (canned) food will fill the Christmas hampers, with surpluses stored in the large food pantry for distribution during the coming year to low income families, as required. As well, approximately \$24,000.00 was collected. The Christmas drive exceeded the objectives of Conference members. In addition to the collection, 24 large low income families have been sponsored by groups of employees and individuals wishing to offer their generous support to the disadvantaged.

The Conference, led by President Bro. Ronald Leduc, covers the territory of 4 parishes: Sainte-Marie, Saint-Joseph, Notre-Dame-des-Champs and Divine Infant, located in a suburb in the East of Ottawa. Home visits constitute the main activity of the Conference. Food is the main item provided to those living in poverty. In 2010, Conference members served 320 families, or 1190 persons with 39% being children. The Guignolée is the major fund raising and food/clothing collection of the year. The Feast of Thanksgiving is also important as a collection of canned food takes place at several primary and high schools of Orléans at that time.

Members of the JMJ Conference are deeply involved in their community by the service to those living in poverty; they are fully engaged in the spiritual dimension of the Society's mission to deepen one's Faith by works of charity. The Guignolée is an annual community event, with social and charitable elements demonstrating the generosity and solidarity of the people of the area towards the less privileged.

Thank You to all the volunteers and artisans for another successful campaign.

May the Infant of the Crèche accompany all members of the Conference and those they serve by giving them peace and joy.

2011 Scholarship of the SSVP Store In Ottawa

In 2010, the Ottawa SSVP store Board created two scholarships worth \$5,000 each. Offered to students from both the French and English Catholic school boards in Ottawa, the scholarships are called respectively "*Bourse Saint-Vincent de Paul*" and "*Saint Vincent de Paul Bursary*". The 2011 recipients of these scholarships are now known.

On the Catholic French-speaking side, the eligibility criteria included aptitude at work, proof of perseverance, abilities showing in concrete school results, stimulating social engagement, and the wish to continue studying at the post-secondary level. The French recipient is **Patrick Ladouceur**, a young graduate from the Samuel-Genest College. He has been active in several different ways: he has been a volunteer, has engaged in many humanitarian causes, was class president, and always present in the recitation of prayer at school. Patrick is now studying at the University of Ottawa.

On the Catholic English-speaking side, the criteria focused on demonstrated involvement and commitment to the practice of the Catholic faith and to social justice in both the high school environment and in a parish. The winner is **Samantha Kosierb**, a recent graduate from Sacred Heart Catholic High School. Samantha was involved in, among other things, "The Well" religious youth group; she travelled to the Dominican Republic to engage in social justice activities there; and she participated in parish activities. She has recently entered the human relations and spirituality program at St. Paul University in Ottawa. Her goal is to eventually be a teacher or a school chaplain.

The event was actually a fund raiser for Vancouver Central Council's Outreach Program. A buffet Roast Beef and Yorkshire Pudding dinner was held on September 18, 2011. Children from a local Irish Dance School started the entertainment in honour of St. Patrick Parish's Irish roots. They were followed by a St. Patrick's parish Filipino dance group who performed a traditional Filipino folk dance, honouring the current ethnicity of our parish. Father Terry Bileski (Central Council Spiritual Advisor and a St. Patrick vocation) gave the keynote address on his 2 year work in the Yukon. Rounded out with raffles and a 50/50 draw, the evening was enjoyed by all and also raised \$4,000 for Central Council.

The success of the evening was due to the collaboration of all of the Conferences in the Vancouver Particular Council, and the strong support of all the member Conferences under Vancouver's Central Council. The Conference Presidents met regularly to plan the evening, obtain needed licenses, promote ticket sales, gather raffle baskets and door prizes, sell raffle and draw tickets, manage the bar, coordinate the dinner music, and many other tasks. The Saint Patrick's Parish Seniors, CWL, and auxiliary SSVP members also pitched in to help the caterer prepare the meal and man the buffet line. The event was sold-out, with Vincentians travelling 40 kilometres and more to participate in this kick-off event.

165 Years... That is Worth Celebrating

On November 12, 1846, in the sacristy of the Québec Cathedral, a young doctor, Joseph-Louis Painchaud, and a few companions founded the first conference of the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul in Canada.

On November 12, 2011, 165 years later, more than 400 Vincentians and guests gathered in that same cathedral to celebrate the anniversary, and express their gratitude for all the blessings received.

The mass was presided by Monsignor Gérald-Cyprien Lacroix, Archbishop of Québec, assisted by Monsignor Maurice Couture, emeritus Archbishop of Québec and Religious of Saint Vincent de Paul. Attending were Vincentians from the Québec diocese, as well as the Montréal, Joliette, Trois-Rivières, and Saguenay dioceses. Mrs. Penny Craig, National President, had come from Windsor, Ontario, to grace us with her presence.

The mass that was celebrated by anticipation was the mass of Christ the King, which gospel is such in line with our mission: *I was hungry and you gave me to eat*, *I was thirsty... I was a stranger... I was naked....*

For the occasion, the French CBC was on site to record the mass that was broadcasted from coast to coast on November 20, 2011, as part of *Le Jour du Seigneur*. The broadcast allowed us to reach Vincentians across the country.

After mass, a fraternal reunion took place at the Musée de l'Amérique française, located next to the Cathedral. During the gathering, Mr. Louis Painchaud, Theology Professor at Laval University, and descendant of the founder, spoke to us about his ancestor and his family.

As well, on that occasion, four *Joseph-Louis Painchaud Awards* were presented: one was presented posthumously to Mrs. Marie-Claire Gingras-Letarte, the first woman to hold the position of President of the National Council, and the other three were presented to Mrs. Sylvie Paquette, of the Mouvement Desjardins, for her contribution to the Québec Central Council, to Monsignor Maurice Couture, all-time friend and collaborator of the Society, and to Mr. Paul Sylvestre, President-Founder of the St-Louis Conference in Sainte-Foy.

Finally, Mr. Réjean Lemoine, historian, launched his book, entitled *Nourrir son âme et visiter les pauvres* (Feed One's Soul and Visit the Poor), recounting the history of the Society in Québec, from its beginning until today. It is a mine of information on the activities of the Society, its evolution through the years, and the considerable influence it had on Québec and region. Let us highlight a few facts: the Society is at the very source of the *Patros* (community centres) and of the arrival in Canada of the Religious of Saint Vincent de Paul. The Society in Québec also contributed to the founding of the Congregation of the Bon-Pasteur Sisters of Québec, and distributed *Direct Assistance* in the 1930s.

Special thanks to the organizing committee: Mrs. Léda Simard-Bouchard, Chairwoman, as well as Mr. Pierre Morissette, President of Québec Regional Council, Gilles Veilleux and Gilles Roy, members of the Notre-Dame Conference in Québec.

To use our National President's expression, it was a wonderful family celebration.

Slave Lake Disaster Recovery Project

Most of the victims of the Slave Lake fire are continuing to live in summer trailers or doubling up with friends. The temporary housing project is behind schedule with merely one of the three temporary home sites open for occupancy and at that site only approximately 30 of the 60 temporary homes currently occupied. Infrastructure for the 3 parks is still under development and housing units continue to be shipped north from the manufacturers.

Some replacement home construction has begun but merely a few foundations have been poured and only these few will be able to continue through to completion over the winter months.

The residents here, whose needs increase significantly as they move into their temporary homes, appreciate the assistance from the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul. They express thanks and support for this project, as well as, future activities that the Society may initiate in their community. There has been exceptional support from the Parish Priest, Fr. Jeyapaul, who is anxious to start a SSVP Conference in the parish. A Highway Van/Distribution Centre has been set up and is opened daily in the afternoon. It consists of a 52 ft. highway van which has been equipped with shelving. The initial inventory of back to school needs has been replaced with dishes, bedding, children's reading materials, handyman tools and small furniture.

The van is sufficiently large for SSVP to service the pressing needs of the community if inventory is continuously restocked for the needs that are identified at the specific time over the next several months. The cold is making it difficult to attend to the Highway Van/ Distribution Centre but arrangements have been made for some heating capacity.

The community disaster recovery program in Slave Lake has some unique features. Many of the residents have left the community. Those with low income or no jobs are being serviced well by the government agencies. Many who have jobs have been doubling up with other families living 2 or 3 families in a home. Temporary semi-permanent homes have been promised by the government as transition facilities. These will house

residents for about 2 years as the burned out neighbourhoods are rebuilt. None of these temporary homes are available as yet. It may be that this project will need to be extended for more than 3 months to satisfy the needs of the community as families go through the transition housing.

Other groups have joined in to help; they include the parishes, the Edmonton Catholic School Board, several schools as well as the SSVP Conferences. All have been collecting tools, dishes, kitchen gadgets, children's reading materials, bedding/blankets and winter clothing.

All these activities have produced an increased awareness of the SSVP in the Slave Lake community and it continues to grow through the interfaith community as well as both school boards. The Youth who now have an awareness of the works of the Society are getting involved through donation drives to assist their fellow youth in Slave Lake. It also seems that the establishment of a Conference in Slave Lake is apparently well seeded.

REMINDER

The name of our organization is Society of Saint Vincent de Paul and the acronym is SSVP.

Certain conferences and councils omit a word in the name or change the acronym.

It is important for the image of our Society that it be identified the same way by all.

Hand in Hand

Hand in Hand is a special works of Halifax Particular Council. The store provides second hand clothing, small household items and a minimal amount of furniture. Although the store is located in Spryfield which is in the western part of Halifax, assistance is given throughout the Halifax Regional Municipality.

Hand in Hand was started over twenty years ago in the basement of St. Michael's church in Spryfield. Very quickly the operation became too large for the basement and Hand in Hand moved across the street to a larger facility. There was a great need and the response for donations was overwhelming so that very soon the second facility became too small.

It was at this point that Halifax Particular Council decided that they would purchase a small two story house in the hopes that this would not only solve the space problem but give us the opportunity to expand the work of Hand in Hand. Under the guidance of Sister Alice Mailman, the Director, the store became a place for training and advocacy in addition to the store. Sister Alice presented courses/workshops on a variety of topics from Sign Language training to Assertive training to cooking classes. Whenever a need for training was brought to the attention of Sister Alice, she would try and accommodate the request.

Sister Alice strongly believed that those who came to Hand in Hand should be treated with love, compassion, dignity and respect. Although she understood that people who came to our door may have little or no money, she believed that it gave the person a sense of pride when they paid for what they needed. The prices were marked very low so the cost would not be a burden on the person. Needless to say, if the person was unable to pay, the clothes were given freely. It is the intention of the board that this will always be the philosophy of Hand in Hand. We are very grateful that Sister Alice was there to guide us at the beginning of Hand in Hand. We have been blessed with many special and caring benefactors and volunteers over the years, It was not long before we ran out of space. Donations took up so much room that we were unable to carry out the training and advocacy courses that Sister Alice had started. There was a double vacant lot next to Hand in Hand which belonged to the city. The Board of Hand in Hand began negotiations with the city to purchase this vacant lot. After many years of delays and difficulties, the difficulties were overcome and Halifax Particular Council purchased the lot and construction began on the current building. The new building was opened November 2010 and it is large enough to house the store, a large sorting area and a second floor with room enough for office space, a boardroom and a kitchen area for the staff and volunteers. In addition, the previous store is temporarily being used for storage.

The past twenty years have been a challenging but rewarding time for those of us involved, but we always felt that the challenge was worth the effort as we knew the need was great. To this day we maintain Sister Alice's and Halifax Particular Council's philosophy of paying a minimum amount if you can but there is no charge if the person is unable to pay. The cost of operating the new building is much greater than our previous building, but the Board of Hand in Hand hopes to find ways that we can off-set the costs so that we do not need to raise our prices. It will certainly be a challenge to make sufficient money to cover our operating expenses without raising prices. However, we are confident that He will find a way so that we can continue to serve His people with the same love, compassion, respect and dignity as we have for the past twenty-one years.
