The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul is a worldwide Christian community, founded in Paris in 1833, by a group of young Catholic lay people.

Membership is open to men and women, young and old. The SSVP asks that members accept fully the Christian ethos and are committed to express their love of God through personal service to their neighbours in need. The service provided by a conference is usually concentrated on home visits, the person-to-person contact with the needy. This is a fundamental part of the Society's mission. However, activities may include "Special Works", which serve people in a wider area or provide specialized service to those living in poverty.

In Canada, more than 14,200 volunteers are serving about 400,000 people each year. Where appropriate, members offer material or other type of assistance to serve those in need overcome crises, and develop with them long-term solutions to their problems.

Mission

The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul is a lay Catholic organisation whose mission is: To live the Gospel message by serving Christ in the poor with love, respect, justice and joy.

Values

The Mission of the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul implies that as Vincentians we:

- see Christ is anyone who suffers

- have personal contact with the poor
 - help in all possible ways

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Message from the President

Twinning

Twining is a Society's fundamental **Special Work** of mutual assistance within Canada and with conferences and councils of developing countries.

Promotional activities of the twinning program was a priority during fiscal year 2014-2015.

A workshop was presented at the 2014 AGA and a Power Point presentation was made to members of the Montreal Central Council in November.

Articles on various aspects of twinning were published in the Vincenpaul-Canada magazine, on the National Council web site and other publications and web sites of Regional and Central councils.

Messages were sent to Councils and Conferences that had demonstrated an interest in an External Twinning in the past.

A new Facebook Group, SSVP Canada Twinning-Jumelage, was created in March 2015.

All Internal Twinning files were reviewed and updated.

The tri-partite agreement USA-Canada-Haiti signed in April 2013 aims to twin 22 Haitian conferences and councils within the next 4 years. Seven (7) new twinning with Haiti were approved in 2014-2015.

Several Twinning Applications from Designated Countries are waiting for a twinning partner from Canada.

Increasing the number of twinning partnerships remains the priority objective of the program.

Summary

The last year involved the shipping of five sea containers to each of five Arctic Communities. The sea cans were picked up empty in Hay River, trucked and spotted around Edmonton, loaded with food stuffs, clothing, house hold items and specific project items as identified by our Northern Community

Contacts. After loading, the sea cans were trucked back to Hay River and put on the barge at the NTCL Terminal. They were sent up the Mackenzie River and across the Beaufort Sea to reach their final destination. All five containers were loaded in May/June and arrived in Sept/Oct. The Communities have already or plan to distribute the products by methods that are specific to their Community.

There has been encouragement from both the religious and corporate communities, as well as the Vincentian membership for growth in this project. The growth will involve support to more Northern communities. Additional volunteers, from both the Northern and the donor community in the south, will be required as will increased support from the transportation industry which has so graciously provided sponsorship for this project. Planning is underway for the development of the 2015 North of 60 Project.

Additionally, SSVP in the Ontario Region is considering a similar assistance program for Communities in Eastern Arctic Canada.

Northern Communities

Sea cans were provided this year to Inuvik, Tuktoyaktuk, Paulatuk, Taloyoak and Gjoa Haven. This is the result of a three year growth of a project initiated several years ago and developed by Sister Fay Trombley of Tuktoyaktuk, Eileen Orysiuk of Calgary and other members of the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul. The model set up in Tuktoyaktuk is considered successful and therefore has become the objective for all the communities, i.e. a location where clothing and food can be stored, sorted and distributed to those in need. Product is sold to those who have money and given to those who have none.

North of 60

Financing

The goal is to use a minimum amount of cash to achieve the objective. Donations of transportation have come from the corporate community and special recognition is due to Inuvialuit Regional and the Development Corporations, NTCL, Canadian North Airlines, Landtran Group of Companies and Continental Carriers for their support. Growth will require further support from the transportation community.

The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul has provided financial assistance from Councils and Conferences in Ontario, Quebec and Winnipeg. Generous donations of food, household items, furniture, and specialty products come primarily from members of the Catholic community and parishes in Edmonton, Winnipeg and southern B.C. The project in 2014 is estimated at having a value of approximately \$400,000. The cash cost of the project was in fact approximately \$3,000.

Donor Community

Many thanks go out to the Catholic Community, their Parishes and the Vincentian Family in the Archdiocese of Edmonton. Edmonton is the gateway to the NWT Arctic North. The transportation corridor and the corporations serving that corridor have been generous with their support. This project has received the attention of others across Canada. Support from the Catholic Community in interior BC as well as Winnipeg, Ontario and Quebec has helped substantially in the ability to provide for those in need. Hundreds of donors and volunteers worked to collect and sort items for sea containers that were located in church parking lots. In several cases the collecting and sorting was done outside in cold and rainy weather. Not an ideal situation and an area for improvement with this project.

Other Aspects of the North of 60 Project

A separate program under this general area of Vincentian Works is a project called Healthy Food for Children. This aspect of the project is being funded separately and has been active since the beginning of 2014. The objective of this project is to supply cash support to the Communities of Taloyoak and Gjoa Haven for the local purchase of food to support a meal preparation and delivery program for children.

International Emergency Releif



The Committee is responsible for ensuring response and follow-up on International Council General (CGI) and National Councils financial assistance requests as a result of natural disasters and humanitarian catastrophes.

Haiti

During this fiscal year, the Committee continued sending funds to the National Council of Haiti, to help victims of the January 2010 earthquake. The National Council, with an Ontario Conference, was also involved in an education project already operating but under financed. The agreement is for a contribution of \$2,500 annually for a period of 5 years. The Board of Directors approved a contribution of \$10,000 to fund a systemic change project of the Vincentian Family in Haiti. The project's goal is for hundreds of women to acquire financial autonomy through training, financial assistance for small business ventures with appropriate follows-up. The National Council received activity reports during the year and Annual Report 2013 from all Haitian Councils during the period.

Philippines

Two major typhoons, Bopha and Haiyan, ravaged the Philippines in 2012 and 2013. The Council General launched a one million Euros international fund raising campaign to help the victims of the disasters. As a result of an appeal by the National President, a sum of \$140,000 was transferred to the CGI in March 2014. A last contribution in the amount of \$7,092 was transferred to the CGI during this fiscal year.

Other Catastrophes and Humanitarian Aid

The Committee approved the transfer of \$27,500 to the ICG during this past year in response to emergency situations in Nicaragua and Peru and, to help Syrian and Iraqi refugees relocated in camps in Lebanon and Jordan.

Social Justice

Ontario Regional Council - Social Justice Committee: I attended 2 meetings held at the offices of the Toronto Central Council. The committee is well attended, enthusiastic and eager to tackle local and regional social justice issues. They are creating lines of communication within their region, which could be of interest to Vincentians in all regions. They have developed some brochures and guidelines that could easily be adapted to other regions. We stand to profit greatly by incorporating some or all of their efforts nationally. I have learned a lot by my attendance at their meetings and I am very grateful to Jim for his invitation to participate in their meetings.

2015 National AGA: We are afforded a great opportunity to highlight social justice this year at the AGA being held in Hamilton ON.

Thanks goes out to Jim Paddon and his ONRC SJ Committee for accepting to prepare and present 3 workshops one each on social justice, systemic change and prison ministry at the upcoming AGA.

What Next: The committee needs to come together as a whole and have its first meeting at the 2015 AGA in Hamilton. The goal is to begin the work of setting national goals and objectives for this committee.

In the meantime I endeavor to continue to keep myself informed and educated on relevant issues of interest to the Society. I encourage all Vincentians to keep the issue of social justice foremost in their prayers as we seek God's will for the Society with regards to pursuing social justice on relevant issues of concern to our poor, marginalized, forgotten and unfortunate neighbours across this great nation and beyond.

Education/Formation

Youth

Emmanuel Bailly Scholarship

The Emmanuel Bailly Scholarship process was revamped in the current year to require the applicants to provide more detailed information on their involvement in the Society, to provide a reference to attest to their involvement and to streamline the application process to a central point for all regions to submit applicants. There was also a push to get the information out to the conferences and councils, which was done through the various communication channels (National distribution lists, Regional distribution lists and youth contacts).

Youth Advisor Handbook

The Youth Advisor Handbook is still in development. This handbook is meant to be provided to the Youth Advisor to guide them in their formation of a youth conference. The next stage will be providing a resource guide for the youth conference members on operating the youth conference. After providing the resources on developing youth conferences, the next step will be to provide information for all conferences and councils on attracting youth to the Society and incorporating them into the conference activities.

World Youth Day 2016

Planning is well underway for World Youth Day 2016, which will be July 25-31 in Krakow, Poland. Prior to World Youth Day, FamVin will once again be holding a meeting of Vincentian youth from July 21-24. The event will be held at Radosna Nowina 2000, a school center that is operated by the Congregation of the Mission approximately 10 km outside of Krakow that can accommodate approximately 1,600 Vincentians. Information on cost for World Youth Day and FamVin are not yet available, but is expected to be consistent with past years. Across Canada, various dioceses have their registration rates at \$2,500 - \$4,000, all-inclusive. Each Region is asked to consider how they are willing to support their youth to attend FamVin and World Youth Day. Based on past experience, I have seen the transformation that youth who attend go through and it is a once in a lifetime opportunity. I am available to discuss how the Regions can organize delegations to attend.

2016 National AGA: Bill Yule has been working with his steering committee to make sure everyone will have a memorable time in Vancouver and UBC June 15 – 19 2016. The campus has been visited several times and all necessary rooms have been tentatively booked subject to the approval of National. We are waiting to hear the theme for next year and the Holy Rosary Cathedral has been booked for the final Mass.

We have recruited Chairs for all Committees and have met twice and will meet again in May to begin putting together a budget for 2016. A video has been created for presentation in Hamilton at the 2015 National AGA.

Quebec Regional Council

However, what about the other months? In 2014, close to 5,000 men and women gave 608,886 hours of volunteer work. This data alone demonstrates the engagement of Society members who provide assistance to approximately 220,000 annually in Quebec.

At the Regional Council level, web users visit the RÊVE D'OZANAM (Ozanam's Dream) website more and more. Members as well as leaders publish an increasing numbers of posts on the site about major interventions and activities of the SSVP in Quebec, for the benefit of the public as well as that of Vincentians. If you have not already done so, we invite you to visit the site at www.lerevedozanam.com.

In addition, we cannot fail to mention the departure of Mr. Jude Bourke as Secretary of our Regional Council and we thank him for his long and dedicated service. Finally, we wish to commemorate the death of Father Lionel Dion, who was the Spiritual Counsellor of the Quebec Regional Council for many years. He was a model of fidelity, always present at Council meetings and a guide full of hope for everyone, sowing peace and joy.

Gratitude and congratulations are offered to the members of the Quebec SSVP. The Board and I wish to celebrate the vincentian engagement in our region. Thanks to all our members and to my colleagues of the Board, namely Michel Olivier, Vice-President, Claude Roy, Treasurer, Lise Blais, Project Manager and Diane Dorion, in charge of the Montreal office.
