

### Society of Saint Vincent de Paul

#### Mission

The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul is a lay Catholic organisation whose mission is:

To live the Gospel message by serving Christ in the poor with love, respect, justice and joy.

#### Values

The Mission of the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul implies that as Vincentians we:

- see Christ is anyone who suffers
- come together as a family
- have personal contact with the poor
- help in all possible ways

The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul is a worldwide Christian community, founded in Paris in 1833, by a group of young Catholic lay people.

Membership is open to men and women, young and old. The SSVP asks that members accept fully the Christian ethos and are committed to express their love of God through personal service to their neighbours in need. The service provided by a conference is usually concentrated on home visits, the person-to-person contact with the needy. This is a fundamental part of the Society's mission. However, activities may include "Special Works", which serve people in a wider area or provide specialized service to those living in poverty.

In Canada, more than 14,200 volunteers are serving about 400,000 people each year. Where appropriate, members offer material or other type of assistance to serve those in need overcome crises, and develop with them long-term solutions to their problems.

# Message from the President

We are pleased to present you our annual report for 2016-2017. It was a pivotal year for the Society since we were celebrating the 170th anniversary of the foundation of the first Conference in Canada.

It was on November 12, 1846, at the Québec Cathedral, that the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul was founded in our country. Since then, we have expanded throughout Canada and are now present in all of its provinces and territories.

One hundred and seventy years later, the Society has more than 850 Conferences and some 15,000 members from coast to coast to coast. In 2016, Vincentians donated almost 1.5 million volunteer hours and helped over 390,000 people in need.

Through our home visits, stores, clothing counters, soup kitchens, food banks, shelters, drop-in centres, affordable housing, prisoner outreach, summer camps, as well as our projects: North of 60 and Seeds of Hope, and our twinning program with developing countries, we find many ways in which to help others. Vincentians put so much love and energy into realizing their mission that those who see them at work have no choice but to want to join them.

The face of poverty is constantly evolving, but we have found ways to adapt and meet the new needs. I am convinced that in the future, there will still be women and men who will want to live the Gospel message by helping others without judgement, with a heart full of love, justice, and joy. Let us ask Blessed Frédéric Ozanam and Saint Vincent de Paul to guide us on this mission.

# **Twinning**

Twinning is the sharing of prayers, contacts and resources by 139 Conferences and Councils in Canada with those of 22 emerging countries. A total amount of \$124,301 was sent to these twins. Several twinning applications, from our 11 Designated Countries of our hemisphere, are awaiting a partner from Canada.

Activities promoting the program continued throughout the year, particularly at the June 2016 AGA, by presentations and invitations to Councils to join the program. 13 new twinning were established during the year.

Articles on various aspects of twinning were published in the VincenPaul-Canada magazine. Many messages about twinning experiences and announcing new partnerships were posted on the Facebook group SSVP Canada Twinning-Jumelage. Vincentians are

encouraged to subscribe to and post their comments on this social network.

The tri-partite agreement Canada-USA-Haiti, signed in April 2013, aimed at twinning 22 Haitian Conferences and Councils within 4 years. This objective was achieved in September 2016.

Administration: Changes to twinning policy were approved by members of the Board of National Council to bring the program up-to-date. The Internal Twinning program was abolished by decision of Board of the National Council in favour of assigning responsibility for support to Conferences and Councils in need to Regional Councils.

## North of 60 Project

This has been the year of collaboration as we see the support of Vincentians from across Canada reaching out to support those in need in the Arctic.

Conferences and Councils from Vancouver, Fraser Valley, Okanagan Valley, Edmonton, Winnipeg, Ottawa, St. Catharine and Windsor are actively providing donations to fill sea containers and forward them to the far north.

Tuktoyaktuk, Paulatuk, Inuvik, Aklavik, Sachs Harbour, Fort Good Hope, Tsiigehtchic, in the Northwest Territories and in Nunavut Territory - Gjoa Haven, Taloyoak, Rankin Inlet, Whales Cove, and Naujaat - these Communities received support from Vincentians. Much of our access to these Communities comes through the Inuvialuit Corporation and the Kivalliq Inuit Association representatives who show us how to get things done. Additionally, Community visits by Vincentians who eat and sleep with those in the Arctic have increased our awareness of how to listen and to do things the right way.

Over the last several years the North of 60 Program has grown through the support of Corporations and Foundations, who share our mission of serving those in need. Special thanks to the transportation industry truckers and marine shippers, without whose help this program would not be within the financial capacity of our Society. As we continue, the level of support grows. This year we have a new effort from Vincentians in BC as we work with the Canadian Coast Guard to provide dehydrated vegetables

to some of the farthest Arctic Communities.

As we continue to build our relationship with these Arctic Communities and grow in support of others we see their trust growing and new found hope can be seen in their smiling faces.

### **Emergency Relief**

The Committee is responsible for ensuring a response and follow-up to financial assistance requests by the International Council General (ICG) and National Councils as a result of natural disasters and for humanitarian aid.

#### Haïti

The National Council continued sending funds to the National Council of Haiti to support victims of the January 2010 earthquake. These contributions are taken from the emergency fund established following this major disaster. In October 2016, hurricane Matthew hit the southern region of Haiti causing hundreds of deaths and important damage to habitations and cultures. Members of the Board of the National Council decided to forward \$600.00 more per semester to Councils of Haiti, 5 Regional Councils and the National Council. A total amount of \$10,800.00 was transferred to Haiti for emergency aid this past fiscal year.

The National Council, with an Ontario Conference, is involved in an education project in Haiti since 2014, for a period of 5 years. A contribution of \$2500.00 was forwarded to Haiti for this project.

#### Other Catastrophes and Humanitarian Aid

There was no transfer of funds to the International Council General for humanitarian aid or as a result of natural disasters this past year, and no specific request for help was received from the ICG.

#### Canada

An ice storm hit the Acadian Peninsula of New Brunswick in January 2017, isolating several communities during several days. A Conference from Moncton brought comfort and material aid to families in distress. A \$1000.00 contribution was forwarded to the Conference in reimbursement of expenses.

### Social Justice

The past year has seen Social Justice continue to grow as an integral part of the mission of the Society of Saint de Paul. While there are many areas we must address in our efforts to advocate and initiate changes that will effectively address the root causes of poverty in Canada there is one main topic for which we need your help and support. The need to educate our members and to encourage their acceptance and support of Social Justice is still a challenge. You can help us by including Social Justice on the agenda of every meeting and by delegating one or more members to act as your rep and lead all Social Justice discussions within your Conference. (www.ssvp.ca) or by joining our Facebook group and subscribing and reading Vincenpaul –

Social Justice newsletter (published online 3 times each year).

In this past year we have been part of the Our Lady of Guadalupe Circle dedicated to actions in response to the Truth and Reconciliation committee report related to

the Indigenous peoples of Canada. We have developed a North American paper on climate change which was a combined effort of the Society in Canada, the USA and Mexico. There is no doubt the effect of climate change has the ability to place even more challenges before the most vulnerable. Restorative justice is also an important issue which seeks to address the complex issues with the criminal justice system, former inmates and the families of victims. We encourage members to step forward and become involved in any of these efforts. We must also help in any possible way we can in welcoming and helping refugees coming to Canada as they try to escape turmoil and begin their lives anew.

Social Justice is also an attractive recruitment tool for new members, both old and young who want to make a difference. We also continue to make contact with other Catholic organizations, as well as other groups, who are also working on poverty issues.

Thank you to Fr Mark Slatter, Associate Professor of Theological Ethics Faculty of Theology Saint Paul University for acting as retreat master for the annual National Council retreat held on March 17th at Notre Dame de la Providence, Orleans, ON. Fr Mark guided us through a realistic account of what is an actual crucifixion not the romanticized version we are all most familiar with. For many this was a rude and disturbing awakening, which took some time to rationalize within our own minds.

I have made initial contact with Newman College in Edmonton to set up a fact-finding meeting for the

development of an online training program.

I have also contacted a Vincentian with a demonstrated interest in developing and maintaining a Vincentian Blog.

The members of the National Training Committee decided to rename the committee and restate our purpose and responsibility to the members of the Society. We also revised the duties, functions and areas of responsibility; to refocus our actions on developing

as decreed by the National Board; and to assist Regions, Councils and Conferences to deliver new and revised training materials and training recommendations to their members. These changes were approved and adopted at the National Board meeting.

Other recent training initiatives and changes that Region, Council and Conference Presidents should be aware of.

Nationally there are changes and additions made to the Screening and Duty of Care documents and procedures; and a new form added, the Abuse Prevention Checklist and Acknowledgment form, to be accompanied by a training session on the various Abuse, Discrimination and Harassment guidelines. These changes are in effect now as part of the screening process for new members. The full details and revised documents and forms can all be accessed

from the Operations manual – forms section #s 9.9, 9.10, 9.11, 9.12, and 9.23.

Presidents of all Councils and Conferences are urged to review their local screening processes to make sure they are following the latest procedures as mandated by National and required to maintain continued Insurance coverage.

As well, Region Presidents were asked to ensure that all Council and Conference Presidents have held training sessions to explain to their present members, volunteers, employees, and special works personnel, the necessity of taking this training on avoiding potential Abuse, Discrimination and Harassment situations, and comply with the requirement to read and sign the Abuse Prevention Checklist and Acknowledgment form # 9.23. It is a compulsory Insurance requirement that everyone must understand and agree to abide by the declarations made on this form.

### Youth

In July, 11 young Vincentians representing our youth conferences in Kitchener-Waterloo, London and Windsor embarked on a pilgrimage to Poland for the Vincentian Youth Days and World Youth Days. This year marked the fourth time SSVP Canada has participated in this global event, meeting other Vincentian youth from around the world.

The pilgrimage focused on the topic of mercy, given the city of Krakow's connection to Pope John Paul II and

St. Faustina, who experienced visions and conversations with Jesus and inspired the Divine Mercy Chaplet. Part of the World

Youth Day experience, is an artistic interpretation of the Way of the Cross, which included reflections on each station on a different corporal and spiritual work of mercy – a very Vincentian way of reflecting on the crucifixion.

There was also the opportunity to visit, pray and venerate at the relics of Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati, who in his youth was a member of the Society and now is a patron of World Youth Day.

As with every World Youth Day, the young Vincentians who attend come home invigorated with the Holy Spirit and inspired in the desire to serve the poor and this year was no exception. Planning is already underway for the next Vincentian Youth Days and World Youth Days celebrations in January 2019 in Panama. Conferences and Councils are encouraged to consider how they can support

youth in their conferences to attend to learn more about the Society, the Vincentian family, and to encourage our young members to build and explore their faith.

### Western Regional Council

Last year the world saw pictures of the fire that destroyed homes and families in Fort McMurray. Our call for help was answered by many Vincentians who donated to help those in need. Our greatest support came from Ontario Region. Phil Bondy provided home visitor training to local Catholic parishioners who have been able to reach out to hundreds of families suffering from the after affects of this disaster

Winnipeg Vincentians are active with St Timothy's Conference mentoring our latest family addition, la Conférence de Sainte-Catherine Labouré et de la Divine Miséricorde, and more growth is expected in Manitoba. Additionally, they collaborate with Salvation Army using their mobile equipment to provide outreach to homeless.

Our two Saskatchewan Conferences in Regina and Prince Albert continue to provide to those in need.

The Calgary Central Council covers a large area including the Banff Rockies, down to the USA border and over to Saskatchewan with 800 Vincentians in 3 Particular Councils and a new Youth Particular Council awaiting approval. Details of their activity can be found at https://ssvpcalgary.org/

The Edmonton Central Council is actively supporting the North of 60 Project, the First Nations initiative which is well underway, and many other activities best described by viewing the website (https://ssvpedmonton.wildapricot.org/). A particular mention however goes

to one of their newer Conferences; Saint-Frère-André Conference was initiated three years ago. This is the only French speaking Conference in Alberta. Its members, all French speaking, originate from three different continents and vary greatly in age. Reconciliation of the different cultures and building intergenerational relations was a challenge and a success.

The first store in the Western Region was started recently in Yellowknife – St Patrick's Vinnie with the collaboration of Sue Armitage and SSVP Stores in Ontario. Their guidance and model for success was the foundation for moving forward.

As I come to the end of my five-year term as President of the Western Region I am humbled by so many Vincentians who have shown a passion to participate; I am excited to have had the opportunity to learn so much; and I am glad that I have had the opportunity to serve.

# Ontario Regional Council

Ontario was busy with many activities in 2016 serving our friends in need including home visits, our friends visiting our SSVP food banks and soup kitchens, as well as visiting the sick and our friends in prison. Our 45 stores helped fill vouchers providing basic necessities for many friends. Our 3 SSVP camps provided an amazing camp experience for children, as well as teenagers who volunteered as camp counselors.

As Blessed Frederic Ozanam stated, we know that charity alone is not enough. Social Justice is also needed – this is the justice we seek in society for those we serve. Systemic Change is the process we use to implement changes to improve social justice for our friends whom we serve.

In Ontario, some Systemic Change projects in place include Seeds of Hope and the Ozanam Education Fund to help our friends overcome the barrier of access to education. Vinnie's Wallet is also in place offering mini loans to our friends dealing with an emergency financial need.

In addition to our Prison Ministry where Vincentians visit inmates, the Dismas Ministry was started in 2016 which provides assistance to returning citizens (former inmates) to help them re-integrate into the community once released from prison.

After my term as President began in 2016, I had the pleasure of making calls to 50 Presidents to hear about the work SSVP is doing in their community, and the challenges they face, such as recruiting members, rejuvenation and succession planning. I am touched by the level of dedication and passion of our Presidents, and the commitment of our many SSVP members who believe in our mission and values of serving the poor.

After hearing from Vincentians across Ontario, our new Executive team will be focusing efforts on spirituality, Council and Conference rejuvenation, member recruitment, youth recruitment, communication, social justice and

advocacy, stores and North of 60 helping our friends in the north.

With the 170th anniversary of SSVP in Canada on November 12, 2016, a number of Councils and Conferences celebrated this milestone by holding a special Mass and having Vincentian Family Time.

### Quebec Regional Council

The Québec Regional Council appointed a new executive in July 2016. We have monthly Skype meetings that help us manage regular affairs and get to know each other better. To those meetings were added two main activities: first, the production and distribution or our yearly magazine, this year's special edition celebrating the 170th anniversary of the foundation of the first Conference in Québec, and secondly, we had a planning meeting in a lodge near Montreal. That 2-day meeting of the expanded executive committee, including our two employees, allowed us, after a spiritual reflection and a brainstorming session, to establish priorities and an action plan that was adopted by our Board in April.

The action plan is divided into two parts: main projects and development activities.

In the "project" section, two projects were retained: OBM (Pencil Case) and North of 60.

The OBM project has been operational since 2001. Since it began, mainly in Montréal and Québec city, over 6 million dollars were distributed to support the beginning of the school year, belonging initiatives and perseverance scholarships. We are planning to improve and financially support that project across Québec as well as make it known in the rest of Canada. The North of 60 project is still in the early stages, but we have the support of our Board to put in place an infrastructure

in 2017 and send our first containers to northern Québec in 2018.

Our development activities will focus on our communications at all levels:

better sharing of information from the top down and from the bottom up about our good deeds and our successes, but also our difficulties, the increase in participation in our local and regional meetings, revitalisation of a training committee, without omitting to insist on an important Québec participation in our national conference which will take place in Québec city in 2017. Finally, our web site makeover is expected in 2018.
