

Message from the Executive Director

Thank you to all members for your dedication and firm commitment to our mission, and for your relentless generosity in helping your neighbours in need. Together, we are building a world of hope and justice while promoting human dignity.

This past year has been an exciting one, achieved by the constant support from many members of the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul. We had our first national campaign where conferences and councils from Victoria to St. John's accepted the invitation of Pope Francis to celebrate the World Day of the Poor, the 33rd Sunday each year in Ordinary Time. Educational material was developed by the national office to ensure a consistent message and image across Canada. We also used this opportunity to launch our promotional video, first visible across Canada during the broadcast of the Daily TV Mass in November.



Assistance to people in need can vary from providing material help (food, clothing, furniture) to simply lending an ear when people need to share their difficulties. Blessed Frédéric Ozanam wrote "Charity is the Samaritan who pours oil on the wounds of the traveller who has been attacked. But it is justice's role to prevent the attack." The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul is more and more focusing on systemic change, looking at upstream topics that addressing poverty reduction. There are many topics to choose from, and a National Action Plan was introduced to determine which poverty relief topic the Society should focus on from coast-to-coast. A multi-year and multi-phase systemic change topic has been identified: Safe, Secure and Affordable Housing.

To assist persons in need, often financial means are an essential requirement. In October 2018, we added capabilities to the national website for donors to direct funds to any conference or council in Canada; this is achieved via the arrival of the ProDon software tool.

We continue to assist Vincentians in their work, helping those in need, by providing up-to-date training material. The four pillars of the SSVP Canada training curriculum are i) Vincentian Life; ii) Leadership; iii) Spirituality; iv) Special Works/Stores. New material is regularly being added and is accessible on the national web site under the "Members" portal.

Vincentians provide assistance to basically 1% of the Canadian population. No offer of assistance, no offer of dignity, and no act of charity is foreign to the Society; that is the strength of the organization.





The SSVP has been present in the Canadian North since 2008. During the summer of 2018, 12 sea containers were filled with food, sewing machines and fabrics, household articles and small furniture, everyday tools, school supplies and sports equipment. Those containers were shipped by truck and then marine transportation to 14 Arctic communities:

NORTHWEST TERRITORIES - Tuktoyaktuk, Paulatuk, Inuvik, Aklavik, Tsiigehtchic, Ulukhaktok and Sachs Harbour.

NUNAVUT - Gjoa Haven, Nauyasat, Rankin Inlet, Whale Cove, Taloyoak, Baker Lake and Kugaaruk.

Twinning opens a window for men, women and children who suffer and lack financial means in the countries under the responsibility of SSVP Canada. The strengthening of ties and material help generate compassion and the joy of serving the most unfortunate. Twinning activity is increasing every year, and thanks to our **164 active twinning partners**, we have distributed **\$170,000** to our **20 beneficiary countries**.
