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Finally, we are approaching the end of the COVID Pandemic, or are we?

Our Society appears to have navigated the stormy pandemic waters quite handily, remaining relatively unscathed overall by adapting to the ever-changing conditions over the last 3 years. Although we are not without casualties, primarily the number of Conferences that were forced into closure or that lost substantial access to regular funding channels due to government restrictions and limits imposed upon the churches. Praise the Lord that our stores and special works have not suffered to the same extent.

We have managed to maintain adequate staffing, members, volunteers and benefactors, across the vast national spectrum, to continue to serve families and persons in need, albeit in a more restrictive and limited capacity from our normal person-to-person in-home visit. We also had to endure and overcome restrictions in the day-to-day service that we normally provide through our special works. Thanks to all who, thinking outside the box, managed to continue to provide a high level of service to all who depend on, sought or required our services.

The person-to-person in-home visit is the single most Charism of the Society recognized the world over. Armed with the Charism, members and volunteers allow those whom they serve to experience the healing power of Jesus' love. This applies equally to all the Society's special works, be it in the soup kitchens, stores, residences, recovery centers, camps, etc.

I hope and pray that we can soon return to the in-home person-to-person visit. We must be watchful and respectful of the different levels of comfort experienced by the individuals and families whom we serve and also of the members and volunteers who serve them. We should never impose our personal level of comfort onto another person. Be aware at all times and take appropriate measures to ensure each person's safety.

Many conferences, isolated conferences and councils have fallen short of or are in dire need of assistance due to the downturn in their normal funding sources. If you are one of the fortunate conferences, isolated conferences or councils who have reduced workloads and increased funding please be generous and plan to assist those not so fortunate.

In closing, let us remember that this is not our work, it is the Lord's. We need to be ever vigilant to His voice and direction. We can only do that through prayer. I encourage you to pray daily to seek the Lord's guidance and assistance.

Ste Marguerite pray for us that we will give freely of our time to others but especially to the poor and marginalized. Amen.

Message From the Executive Director

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The founders of the Society in Paris in 1833 would be proud of the dedication and firm commitment of our Canadian members who continued assisting persons in need, in spite of the Public Health requirements during the second year of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Mission of the Society continues to be important with the personalization of assistance; this approach is anchored in Catholic Social Teaching, inspired by focusing on the dignity of the human person; Vincentians live their faith by their actions.

The 2021-2024 Strategic Plan adopted in June 2021 defined 9 objectives focusing on four pillars: Leadership, Vincentian Life, Spirituality, and Special Works; the different objectives of the National Strategic Plan were laid out so that conferences or councils can adopt some of these objectives to strengthen the Society and to create a common direction in the Society. Many objectives leverage the evolving set of technological advances available to a charity to progress in this ever-changing world, items such as ongoing social media presence and name recognition in the community, and fund development technics. The strategic plan includes an intrinsic care for our environment which the circular economy thrift stores provide by giving back to the community.

It is important to note the partnership with Second Harvest and their Food Rescue program allowing conferences and councils to take advantage of the fresh produce available in their local communities; this is well aligned with Pope Francis' encyclical *Laudato Si'* on care for our common home, by reducing waste and reducing green gas emissions.

On Friday November 12, 2021, as part of continuing to modernize the National office infrastructure, in conjunction with the 175th celebration of the Society in Canada, a new National web site was launched. The National Member Portal phase 1 has been used in trials with multiple conferences and councils; with the development of phase 2, the online financial and statistics reporting will be introduced in the fall of 2022 allowing automatic consolidation of reports once conferences have submitted them.

Blessed Frédéric Ozanam wrote **"Charity is the Samaritan who pours oil on the wounds of the traveler who has been attacked. But it is justice's role to prevent the attack."** The National campaign on housing under the theme *Safe, Secure and Affordable Housing is a Human Right*, continues to spur initiatives across the country. Partnerships with different groups having a common goal of providing to persons in need continue to flourish with the multiple social justice initiatives the Society is involved with.

Special Projects

A bed for Every Child

The Bed for Every Child project was conceived to help alleviate some of the ill effects of poverty on children in the Brant/Brantford community.

The goal is to provide a new bed to a child in an underprivileged home who would otherwise not have a bed in which to sleep. These children are currently sleeping on the floor or carpet or couch or are sharing a bed with parents and/or several siblings. The living conditions in these homes are personally witnessed by SSVP Brant home visitors, who engage in home visits to determine the extent of the need within these families.

To date, over 280 beds have been given to these very under-privileged children.

La Dépannerie:

Your Neighbourhood Solidarity Grocery Shop

La Dépannerie is a low-cost grocery store, open to the public, where you can find a healthy and varied food offer. It thus promotes physical and economic access to fresh fruits and vegetables.

Following a consultation with users of our services, we noted that they often leave with the same type of non-perishable food. Lack of easy access to fresh food has been mentioned several times: this is how our solidarity grocery project emerged.

The project was set up to meet the needs of people with low incomes or who are food insecure, who become members of La Dépannerie. However, the grocery store is open to all types of households (single people, single-parent families, large families, students, etc.) regardless of their economic situation.

Seeds of Hope

Alleviating dental suffering!

Unmet dental needs can lead to health consequences downstream such as gum disease, tooth loss, infection, heart disease, and loss of self-esteem. We witness dental suffering on an almost daily basis with our encounter with people in need.

- Connecting children to dental services
- Adult teeth cleaning
- Emergency dental for adults

Twinning - Peru

Community Cooking Pots

The SSVP Superior Council in Peru buys or accepts donations of food that is brought to nine neighborhoods in the District, where teams of women (cooking pot mothers) prepare the food and distribute rations. Food is prepared over fires in several 50-litre pots. The women cook on the streets or in houses without the minimum basic needs. Beneficiaries participate in the program by supplying firewood or material for cooking.

"The Conferences within Durham Particular Council's area voted unanimously to support this twinning project. While continuing to support local Neighbours in Need, the overarching sentiment was that we can support those both near and far to combat food insecurity. We are all interconnected in our faith, and generosity is one small way to show our humanity."
