In those days Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leaped in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and exclaimed with a loud cry, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? For as soon as I heard your greeting, the child in my womb leaped for joy. Mary's journey was one of joy, revealing her love and concern for her dear cousin. It is the same love Blessed Rosalie Rendu encouraged: "Be kind and love. For love is the first gift to the poor. They will appreciate your kindness and love more than all else you can bring them."

As Vincentians, we are aware that the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul began with Frederic Ozanam and his friends conducting home visits to their neighbours in need. We continue in the spirit of our founders with the fundamental work and hallmark of the Society, the home visit. In some situations, it may not be possible to conduct home visits. Wherever we meet those in need, whether in homes, on the streets, outreach programs or in Thrift stores, Vincentians are visiting and bringing Christ to those we serve. Mary's visit with Elizabeth's resembles the visits Vincentians have with those we serve. Visits provide Vincentians with the opportunity to develop a meaningful relationship with those we serve. They can be a rewarding and informative time for all; identifying ways to help, and understanding issues relating to systemic change, and concerns requiring advocacy.

The essence of Mary and Elizabeth's visit provides a beautiful example for our Vincentians lives. Mary offered her full presence to Elizabeth, and likewise Elizabeth was fully present to Mary. In their face-to-face encounter and embrace, they mutually revealed joy and love. Their visit was filled with prayer and attentiveness to each other. Like these two outstanding women, may we respond immediately with attentiveness, joy and love to those needing our help.
